Dear parents and caregivers

## Welcome

I extend a very warm welcome to all new students, families and to staff who are new to our school community. Despite the unexpected 3-day lock-down last week, we have quickly re-settled and are back to routines. We value the positive relationships with parents, and I encourage you to contact the school if you have any queries about the learning culture at Howick College. Our school's vision is to *inspire a community of passionate learners* and we appreciate the important part parents provide in helping us achieve this vision. Underpinning our vision are *our 4 C values of courtesy, commitment, curiosity and courage.* 

We have high educational standards and celebrate student success at every opportunity but to have high standards we also have high expectations. Some of these expectations include understanding and consistently demonstrating our values. These qualities, alongside subject knowledge will provide a platform for future success.

#### Coronavirus

As mentioned earlier, we continue to carefully manage the risk and regularly monitor the situation by taking advice and guidance from health agencies and the Ministry of Education. Decisions to close the school are never made lightly and inevitably cause significant interruption but we should feel confident that our government and health agencies are always prioritising actions in the best interests of all New Zealanders. Our distance learning programmes are effective and minimise any potential risk to learning. Below are some of the ways in which we can continue to protect ourselves:

## **NCEA** provisional results

In just about all areas of NCEA we perform better than national and decile norms. National averages include all schools in NZ from decile 1-10. Decile averages includes ONLY decile 8-10 schools. Howick College is a decile 8 school.

# **Summary Parent Survey Analysis 2020**

## STATISTISTICAL DATA OF RESPONDENTS

456 Respondents, about 26% of total Howick College parent community; 75% had 1 child at Howick College; 25% had 2 children at Howick College; Respondents were mainly parent of Year 9, Year 10 and Year 11 students; 65% Respondents were mainly NZ European

## **MOTIVATION**

#### **ANALYSIS:**

All respondents were consistently positive about how the school motivates their child/children in a variety of ways. There were 2 areas which fell below the average ranking of 85% for all other questions regarding motivation being

- Howick College provides appropriate access to career Advice and guidance (66% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed) – it should be noted that 24% (101 respondents were unsure)
- Howick College provides appropriate information to support subject selection (73% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed) – it should be noted that 13% (60 respondents were unsure)

#### **KEY ACTIONS FOR 2021:**

We will include a new leadership inquiry into school career systems and structures to ensure pathways for all learners are enhanced.

## **LEARNING**

## **ANALYSIS:**

Average ranking in the 'agree and strongly agree' response section was 70%. Parents overwhelmingly regularly check in with their child about their learning (95%). Most of the anecdotal parent criticism was the apparent variable teaching practice across the school and lack of timely communication.

## **KEY ACTIONS FOR 2021:**

We will continue to strengthen our staff professional development programme to ensure we consistently maintain highly engaging and effective teaching practice in the classroom.

## **TEACHING**

## **ANALYSIS:**

Many respondents were unsure. Parents felt teachers could do more to help 'realise their child's potential'. Co-curricular acknowledgment by school was low but had the highest 'unsure' factor of all questions in this section. Overall, there is a strong suggestion from the feedback that teachers should provide more communication back to parents about teaching in general. The impact of Covid-19 is acknowledged by some parents.

#### **KEY ACTIONS FOR 2021:**

We will include a new leadership inquiry into improving communication with parents. We will put in place a clear communication and engagement plan.

## Summary Parent Survey Analysis 2020 continued

## **ENVIRONMENT**

## **ANALYSIS:**

Based on the feedback, parents value their children conducting themselves appropriately against some family values that are considered important to them. Only 49% of parents could recall the school's values. Understanding unique place for Maori was an area that was poorly understood by parents – 37% but 60% were unsure of what this means for them. About 80% of parents considered Howick College had a healthy learning culture for their students.

## **KEY ACTIONS FOR 2021:**

We will continue to strengthen our current students' values education programme which will be communicated to the wider parent community. We will include a new leadership inquiry into understanding Maori - Te Ao Maori.

# SPECIAL FOCUS: NCEA MERIT & EXCELLENCE ENDORSEMENT UE PATHWAYS / SCHOLARSHIP

#### **ANALYSIS:**

Parents overwhelmingly value merit and excellence attainment for their child (94% agree/strongly agree) while 82% value the UE qualification. It must be noted that most of the respondents to the survey had children in the junior school. In terms of scholarship aspirations and support, 61% of parents agreed/strongly agreed but 18% were unsure. Overall, the feedback strongly suggests that parents support higher levels of achievement including the university entrance qualifications for their child/children. There were significant 'unsure' positions which indicates a need for more explicit communication and information.

## **KEY ACTIONS FOR 2021:**

We will include a new leadership inquiry into strengthening our focus on supporting students achieve higher qualifications.

## **SCHOOL VISION**

#### **ANALYSIS:**

Some very positive comments considering a reasonable number of 'unsure' indications from parents. 75% (17% unsure) parents felt the school was meeting its vision expectations, 84% thought the school was 'good' for the child and 80% (13% unsure) felt it was progressing well. The school seems to be compared often to what other schools have or don't have.

## **KEY ACTIONS FOR 2021:**

We will continue to strengthen understanding and application of our school vision and values.
